This Good Friday while we reflect on the pain and suffering of Jesus, and of the world we live in. As we think about our restricted lives, as we try to keep safe, we can pray for the world. Pray that through all the difficulties this pandemic is causing, we and the whole world will hear Jesus speak and recognise Him for who He really is. The God who loves us more than we could ever imagine.

Stay safe and may God's love and the light of Christ, take away the darkness in our lives until we meet again. Amen
